


Girls and women with HIV: global situation

- ❖ 39.9 million people living with HIV at the end of 2023
 - 20.5 million women aged 15+
 - 1.4 million children (<15 years)
- In 2023, about 3200 new HIV infections a day among adults (aged 15+)
 - 44% are among women

In Aotearoa New Zealand.....



- Total of 893 females have been notified with HIV since the start of surveillance in 1985
- ❖ 521 women were on subsidised ART at mid 2023 (Pharmac)
- ❖ Average of 18 women diagnosed in New Zealand per year
- ❖ Total of 40 transgender people notified with HIV since the start of surveillance most were transgender women
- ❖ Average of 2 transgender people diagnosed in New Zealand per year over the past 10 years






NATIONAL HIV ACTION PLAN FOR AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND 2023–2030

Goal 3: Decreased mortality and the negative consequences of HIV on health and wellbeing


Goal 4: Decreased experiences of stigma and discrimination for people living with HIV

Goal 5: Increased equity in relation to all HIV goals and objectives



By gender:




Place of acquisition for women and transgender women:

Average of 10 women acquired HIV in NZ per year


Annual rate of HIV diagnoses in women per 100,000: New Zealand, Australia & United Kingdom




Characteristics of women diagnosed with HIV in Aotearoa New Zealand


Age at time of diagnosis for women diagnosed (2014 – 2023)


Current estimated age of all women living with HIV






Ethnicity of women diagnosed with HIV in New Zealand (2014 – 2023)







Place of residence of women diagnosed with HIV in New Zealand (2014 – 2023)



Means of acquisiton of HIV of women diagnosed in New Zealand (2014 – 2023)




Reason for test of women diagnosed in New Zealand (2014 – 2023)








Births to women living with HIV (2014 – 2023)




Total births 1998 to 2023 N=215

Births to women living with HIV (1998-2023)




Perinatal transmission

Maintain zero cases of perinatal transmission


People first diagnosed with HIV overseas





Summary

- ❖ Average of 10 women per year with HIV acquired in Aotearoa → 2030 goal ~1
 - late diagnosis
- Increase in the number of overseas diagnosed women care and support
 - women of all ethnic groups
