Developing professional and tailored/ culturally appropriate resources and information for the refugee and migrant communities, organisations and service providers





- Working with Maori, with the input of refugee and migrant communities to put together a working model that best serves these two communities






- Priority groups:

 - Māori at risk of and living with HIV;
 - Sex workers;
 - People who inject drugs,
 - Transgender and non-binary people
 - People who have migrated from high HIV prevalence countries






















Why is the programme needed

- There is lack of awareness and understanding of HIV within the refugee and migrant communities
- There are misconceptions, stigma, and discrimination towards refugee and migrants living with HIV
- They may be reluctant to disclose the needs and support required - or may not know where to get assistance and guidance.
- There is also a lack of awareness and understanding about how to prevent HIV among refugee and migrant organisations, leaders and service providers

Community Shaped Programme

Role of Community Leaders, Organisations and Service Providers

- Access and outreach
- Trusted messengers and role models
- Cultural relevance and community ownership

Auckland Community Consultation

Key Challenges

- Religion and cultural factors are barriers
- Lack of awareness about HIV
- Misconceptions and doubts about its existence and relevance
- Stigma surrounding HIV
- Taboo and discomfort hindering discussions
- Lack of education on transmission methods
- Fear of deportation and therefore reluctant to test and seek treatment

Auckland Community Consultation

Strategies for HIV Awareness and Prevention

- Culturally appropriate sexual health education
- Engaging influential community figures to break barriers
- Train-the-trainer model for community involvement
- Utilising workshops, playgroups, and online platforms

Action Plan

- We are working with Maori, with the input of refugee and migrant communities to put together a working model that best serves these two communities
- Continue consulting communities across the nation
- Generate a report with the community feedback
- Finalise the official name, a logo and a working model
- Develop a website and digital content for all social platforms culturally sensitive and informative
- Develop resources specifically for the refugee and migrant communities
